## Website overview of our Pupil Premium Strategy 2017-18

The pupil premium is additional funding for publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities and to close the gaps between them and their peers. Our strategy is constantly being evaluated and reviewed. The next formal date for review is 10 January 2018.

## Pupil premium: conditions of the grant:

The Department for Education (DfE) has paid the Pupil Premium Grant for 2017/2018 to our school. Each child entitled to Free School Meals is allocated £1320.

The grant may be spent by maintained schools for the purposes of the school: that is to say for the educational benefit of pupils registered at that school and on community facilities, for example services whose provision furthers any charitable purpose for the benefit of pupils at the school or their families, or people who live or work in the locality in which the school is situated.

## Allocation

The grant is to be allocated in two parts, which are:

- Pupil premium for pupils known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM) in any of the previous six years and service children in mainstream schools £1320
- Pupil premium for children looked after (CLA) £1900
- Forces children £300

Pinewood Infant School and Foundation Unit was allocated £59,400 plus £9,500 for five Looked After Children and £300 for a service child.

How we are using the allocation to support our children, and main strategies we use to promote social mobility and close the gap in attainment between disadvantaged children and others:

- TAs in each classroom supporting quality first teaching and delivering targeted intervention
- One to one additional support with Reading
- Targeted intervention with Writing and Maths
- Booster groups before and after school to improve progress in Reading, Writing and Maths
- Narrative Therapy, Talk boost and additional fine motor/speaking and listening groups
- Comprehension groups (NS and GDS) in KS1
- Teacher release time for structured conversations with parents of targeted Pupil Premium children
- Teaching Assistant support- ensuring the children have support from extra adults within classes to provide pupils with one to one support, booster groups, guided reading groups, nurture and enrichment groups.
- From January 2017 3 days of a week Deputy Head Teacher to work with targeted groups of pupil premium children for phonics, English and Maths and to lead on Pupil Premium Champion work supporting parents of targeted pupils to help raise attainment
- Financial support for families to access residential visits, class outings and in school visitors such as theatre groups
- Language Lead extra work 1 hour per week with Pupil Premium children (Talk Boost)
- ELSA training and 2 hours a week TA to work on emotional health and emotions coaching with targeted individuals, supporting motional development and other barriers to learning
- Extra-curricular clubs
- Greater Depth groups to promote higher attainment for higher achieving Pupil Premium children.
- Continuing professional development for staff

Pupil Premium Allocation for April 2017-April 2018: £59,400 plus £9,500 for 'looked after children', £300 service child. (Each term £23,067)

The number of Pupil Premium children fluctuates continually and much work with these children occurs outside of the additional pupil premium allocation, but here is an overview of our Pupil Premium expenditure.
